

Exegesis

• Exe whasis?



Exegesis

- What did it mean to the writer and readers?
- Find out what the text (including names, symbols, and places) originally meant; this task is called exegesis.

Hermeneutics

Herman Who?



Hermeneutics

- What does it mean to us?
- Apply what the text means to ourselves and our situations. We call this second task hermeneutics.

Aim of Good Interpretation

- The aim is to get at the plain meaning of the text.
- The test is that it makes good sense of the text.

Guides for Interpreting Prophecy

- Prefer the straight forward reading
 - Interpret grammatically
 - Interpret historically

Interpret in Context

- Local context
- Context in the book
- Context of other prophecies and the Bible

Methods of Prophetic Revelation

- Straight forward utterance
- Types
- Symbols
- Parables
- Dreams and visions

Straight forward utterance

Jesus' death and resurrection: Mark 9:31

Types

Brass serpent: Numbers 21:9
(symbol for Jesus, John 3:14-15)

Symbols

 Fiery red dragon: Revelation 12:3 (symbol for Satan, Revelation 12:9)

Parables

 Wheat and Tares: Matthew 13:24-30 (End times judgment)

Dreams and visions


 Nebuchadnezzar's Dream: Daniel 2 (presents world empires through history)

Multiple fulfillment

- Sometimes a prophecy might apply to two related events.
- Example Elijah's future coming was partially fulfilled by John the Baptist: Matthew 17:10-13, Mark 9:12-13, Luke 1:17, John 1:21.

One Mountain?

 Sometimes from a distance two mountains look like one. Likewise two fulfillments of the same prophecy is possible.
